Nearly forty years of social commitment

The Welfare and Development Association ABD is a non-profit, non-governmental organisation born in the 1980s, at a time when drug use and the AIDS pandemic were wreaking havoc among the young population. It was in that context that a group of professionals and volunteers came together to provide care for drug users, their families and the neighbours and neighbourhoods around them. Today, ABD continues to work to reduce inequalities and social and health-related vulnerability through a wide range of actions.

The ABD's social action covers all aspects of society, as we support individuals and communities in very diverse situations. These include intellectual disability, physical and mental health problems, the lack of basic necessities such as work, housing and electricity, gender violence and child abuse, the mere fact of growing old or moving to another country, drug use, discrimination based on gender, ethnicity or origin, and the lack of access to services, among others.

In every case, our aim is to contribute to strengthening the individuals, groups and communities who suffer exclusion processes and to strengthen their abilities and defend their rights. Our essence



We have our own intervention model. That model is the framework that we have established as the base for all our social actions. It is made up of twelve essential shared principles that set our daily practice apart from others. They constitute a shared horizon and serve as a space for shared recognition for the entire organisation.

The principles of our social intervention model are as follows:

- 1. Social justice as a criterion to stop the processes of social exclusion.
- **2.** Gender equality and non-discrimination based on age, gender, ethnicity or sexual orientation, among others.
- 3. The subject of law as the core principle of a service focused on the active individual.
- **4.** Incorporation of the global agenda and the defence of rights into the institution's strategy.
- 5. A critical outlook to deconstruct beliefs and prejudices in social action.
- **6.** Research and evidence to challenge commonly accepted practices and promote innovation.
- 7. A multidimensional approach that contemplates the interaction of biological, psychological, social and educational aspects.
- 8. Proximity and social inclusion as strategies to strengthen the relationships that provide support to the people.
- 9. Work from the margin, defending methodologies with low levels of demands.
- **10.** An ethic of responsibility as the core of a public service undertaking.
- **11.** Non-profit with the support of governance for the promotion of social changes.
- **12**. A transformational economy to reinforce an alternative social ecosystem.
