Moving forward leaving no one behind

The year 2021 has been marked by an exceptional context due to the health, social and economic crises caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. It was a year in which we started to see the light at the end of the tunnel, while still living in a very delicate scenario.

26.4% of the Spanish population is at risk of poverty and/or social exclusion. Furthermore, the people suffering the most are those in situations of high vulnerability: children, young people, women, immigrants, the elderly, and people with intellectual disabilities.

The lack of access to adequate housing has a big impact and for many families basic rights, such as access to energy and food, are not being fulfilled. People with drug dependencies are still stigmatized. The scourge of gender-based violence continues to take lives, and we have a long road ahead to achieve gender equality.

Facing this reality, at ABD we continued to accompany people in situations of vulnerability and to deliver programmes and essential support for them. We are a singular agent, and indispensable in the social and healthcare field. We remain present, and we feel that we cannot step aside.

ABD comprises the entire social base: professionals, users, families, volunteers, entities, and collaborating companies. Together we have built a cross-cutting community network to provide accessible, welcoming, shared, innovative and supportive answers that promote rights and reduce inequalities. We are present in more than 100 platforms and form part of the boards of the FCD, UNAD, RIOD, UNAF, CEOMA, FCVS, FSM, FEDAIA, NEWNET, TEDI, EUCLID NETWORK and ECIU. In addition, since 2019, we have a Special Advisory Status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC).

We look at the present with satisfaction for the work done, and we see the future with hope and excitement for the new projects that will lead us to the world that we want. We move forward without leaving anyone behind.

More than forty years of social commitment

The ABD Welfare and Development Association is a **non-governmental and non-profit organization that was established in the 1980s**, when drug use and the AIDS epidemic were wreaking havoc among the younger populations. In this context, a group of professionals and volunteers came together to offer care to drug users, their families, and the surrounding neighbourhoods. Today, ABD continues to work **to reduce inequalities and social and health-related vulnerability** through a wide range of actions.

ABD's social action is cross-societal, as we support individuals and communities experiencing very diverse situations: physical and intellectual dependence; mental, physical and emotional health problems; a lack of basic needs, such as housing or electricity; gender violence and child abuse; the mere fact of growing old or migrating to another country; drug use; discrimination based on gender, ethnicity or origin; or a lack of access to services and jobs, among others.

Aligned with the UN SDGs

Our purpose is to contribute to the empowerment of people, groups and communities that suffer exclusion processes, boosting their capacities and defending their rights. We believe in the need to create common strategies and have therefore reaffirmed our commitment to align with the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Some years ago we joined the 2030 Agenda, and this year we have become one of the first organizations from the Third Sector to receive the international certificate of achievement of UN SDGs awarded by IFGICT.

NO POVERTY



- 263 people experiencing homelessness benefited from social housing programmes. By guaranteeing them access to housing, we reduce their vulnerability.
- 447 elderly individuals in nursing homes and housing with support services that promote their right to self-sufficiency.

2 ZERO HUNGER



- 2,757 vulnerable individuals have had access to essential goods through charitable cooperatives.
- 237,609 kilos of food have been distributed, to guarantee the right to a healthy, nutritious and sufficient diet.

3 GOOD HEALTH



- 4,080 people in treatment for substance abuse and 19,395 in alcohol and substance abuse prevention programmes.
- 1,494 elderly individuals cared for in senior centres, nursing homes and through home care services that promote health and self-sufficiency.

- 26,745 families at family meeting centres offering emotional bonding, sharing of experiences, and family mediation.
- 15,572 youths have participated in workshops on sexual health, addiction prevention, non-violence, coeducation, LGTBQI+ equality and interculturality.
