

A social front against COVID-19

The year 2020 has been a very difficult one. An unprecedented year marked by health, social and economic crises caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Faced with this exceptional scenario, from the very beginning the ABD Welfare and Development Association has worked to build a social front to combat these circumstances and to prevent even more devastating consequences for people in vulnerable situations.

With COVID-19, we have been challenged by the emergencies experienced by the families and people we serve. Our commitment to all of them pushed us to quickly adapt to be able to provide remote care, so that nobody would be left behind.

Furthermore, we implemented a number of new resources:

- + A primary care centre for homeless people with substance abuse problems.
- * A social emergency facility to host families in vulnerable situations.
- + COVID-specialized teams at the home care services and residences.
- + Four residential apartments for single-mother families.
- * The #yositeveo donation campaign to provide financial support to families who are unable to cover their basic needs.

It never rains but it pours

The exceptional nature of these times has brought out the best in our vocation. Professionals, volunteers, and all of us who form part of the entity's social base have been rowing in the same direction. Together we have worked to guarantee rights. We have responded to the emergency without losing sight of the importance of activism, the empowerment of people, and mutual aid.

The pandemic has only accentuated systemic inequalities. It never rains but it pours. The global uncertainties of 2020 and the coming years require welcoming, compassionate, shared and supportive responses that guarantee rights, reduce inequalities, and lead us toward the world we want.



Almost forty years of social commitment

The ABD Welfare and Development Association is a non-governmental and non-profit organization that was established in the 1980s, when drug use and the AIDS epidemic were wreaking havoc among the younger populations. In this context, a group of professionals and volunteers came together to offer care to drug users, their families, and the surrounding neighbourhoods. Today, ABD continues to work to reduce inequalities and social and health-related vulnerability through a wide range of actions.

ABD's social action is cross-societal, as we support individuals and communities experiencing very diverse situations: physical and intellectual dependence; mental, physical and emotional health problems; a lack of basic necessities, such as housing or electricity; gender violence and child abuse; the mere fact of growing old or migrating to another country; drug use; discrimination based on gender, ethnicity or origin; or a lack of access to services, among others.

Common strategies to address major social challenges

Our purpose is to contribute to the empowerment of individuals, groups and communities suffering from exclusion processes, to enhance their capacities, and defend their rights. We believe in the need to develop common strategies and, therefore, **ABD acceded to the 2030 Agenda**, a comprehensive and multidimensional project that sets out a series of sustainable development goals aimed at addressing the major social challenges and leading us toward the world we want.



Local action, global horizon



- 244 people experiencing homeless**ness** benefited from social housing programmes. By guaranteeing them access to housing, we reduce their vulnerability.
- 429 elderly individuals in nursing homes and housing with support services that promote their right to self-sufficiency.



8.072 social actions implemented to help guarantee access and the right to energy for households in vulnerable situations.



- 662 vulnerable individuals have had access to essential goods through charitable cooperatives.
- 40.350 kilos of food have been distributed, to guarantee the right to a healthy, nutritious and sufficient diet.

- 1,125 people in itineraries of social and labour insertion through orientation. training and research programmes.

- 5,381 people in treatment for substance abuse and 8.764 in alcohol and substance abuse prevention programmes.
- 1,969 elderly individuals cared for in senior centres, nursing homes and through home care services that promote health and self-sufficiency.

- 159 individuals with intellectual disabilities attended to, promoting social inclusion, ensuring equal opportunities and reducing inequalities.
- 22.218 individuals of 102 different **nationalities** offered care through immigration, international protection, refugee, translation, and intercultural mediation programmes.





- 21,191 families at family meeting centres offering emotional bonding, sharing of experiences, and family mediation.
- 13,640 youths have participated in workshops on sexual health, addiction prevention, non-violence, coeducation, LGTB+ equality and interculturality.

- 67 social transformation communication campaigns and actions aimed at building sustainable, inclusive and participatory cities and communities.
- 7 community empowerment projects designed to promote social inclusion, sustainability and resilience through sport, agroecology, technology, and voluntary action.





- 2.994 women and their children who are victims of gender violence in recovery, psycho-educational care and feminist empowerment programmes.
- 777 mothers at social risk involved in positive parenting programmes through psycho-social care and the reinforcement of the bond in early childhood.

- We are present on 121 platforms, 10 of which are international, an alliance for social transformation.
- We have implemented 8 international projects with 12 countries to promote knowledge exchange and social innovation.
